Your Library Connections

The Genre Horror

As summer creeps into autumn, eyes turn toward the eerie and macabre as Halloween approaches. Readers want horror books.

I personally love Horror as a genre because it's one of the few modes of literature in which there is no guarantee that any character will survive until the end. There are real consequences and no promises, which I find refreshing, and draw me to find out where a story is going, or what brought us to where we are. Recently, I just finished a Sci-Fi Horror book about what amounted to a haunted abandoned spaceship story called *Dead Silence* by S.A. Barnes. I was impressed by the author's ability to take a topic, usually buried in gothic mansions overlooking a moor, and weave it masterfully into a space and starship setting.

But to those who prefer serial killers or more realistic horror. I would recommend Thomas Harris's modern classic *Red Dragon*, which introduced the world to Hannibal Lector, or Douglas Preston's *The Monster of Florence*, to learn about the real (and still unsolved) series of brutal abductions and murders in Italy that inspired Thomas Harris.

Of course, the greatest variety within one author for the spooky season is always to be found within the works of the master, Stephen King. Any kind of story, any subgenre you could imagine, he's touched on it at least one. Western? The Dark Tower. Possession? Pet Cemetery. Vampires? Salem's Lot. End of the world plagues? The Stand. Aliens? The Tommyknockers. And if you don't care for clowns...well then IT won't improve your outlook in the slightest. And The Shining has made me avoid Colorado entirely.

No matter what flavor of fear you desire, we've got something to appeal to your tastes here at the Westport Free Public Library. Be it book or movie, film or graphic novel; there's plenty of potential paranormal portions patiently percolating. And we swear all of the scare is just good fun. None of it will follow you after you close the cover of the book...

But where is that knocking coming from anyway...

Westport Writing Opportunity

Midori Evans, founder of Midori Creativity, is a certified creativity coach, offering Project, Recovery, Transition, and Business Development coaching. She conceived an idea for a community wide creative writing project and is inviting everyone to participate.



Tell readers more about your project:

Westport Writes Together through the Seasons celebrates the power of creative writing and community. The goal is to capture memories and stories about Westport and its landscape, seasons and people and then publish the stories for all to read. The project began September 19th.

How did you conceive this project?

I love to create new and unique ways for people to connect to nature and to each other. It's about sharing stories by capturing images, feelings, and moments in time, on paper. I do a lot of work with people who don't think they can write. I tell them: if you can speak, you can write.

Imagine taking a pleasant walk on the beach or on a favorite trail in Westport and then conveying what you saw, heard, or how you felt, in those moments. I help people put their feelings and images on paper to share with others. Anyone can do it with a little direction.

This project is not about being a great writer. It's about telling stories together as a town, knowing that you are creative in more ways than you realize. It's also about sharing our love of Westport with each other in a different way.

At the end of the project, what we write together will become contemporary history. The Westport Historical Society will digitize and save the project so future generations can experience 2022.

Everyone in Westport. Come and share a story about a place or an experience.

World of Books

Wicked Scary: New England Horror Stories

New England has a long history of horror literature, from authors like Edgar Allen Poe to the extremely prolific Stephen King. By the way his short story *Cruel Shoes*, darkly seared the memory of this unemployed public health nurse in early 1982. There is now a more recent writer of horror who has caught Stephen



King's attention, Paul Tremblay. King, who says that he is "hard to scare" found that Tremblay's book, *Head Full of Ghosts* (2015) "scared the living hell out of me", with its internet era spin on demonic possession.

Mr. Tremblay was born in Colorado, but grew up and still resides and works as a math teacher in Massachusetts and worked at a toy factory in Salem as a young man. He has won the Horror Writers' Association's *Bram Stoker Award* and is the author of four horror novels, two crime novels and a short story collection. The film adaptation of his book, *Knock at the Cabin* is being directed by M. Night Shyamalan and will be released as *The Cabin at the End of the World* in February 2023. *A Head Full of Ghosts* has been optioned for a future movie production by Robert Downey, Jr.

Jason Sheehan of NPR reviewed the short story collection, *Growing Things* and wrote that it is a "terrible thing to read a Paul Tremblay story because his words will have this way of getting under your skin, crawling inside you like bugs and just...living there." That sounds familiar to me. It is the season for horror, dark fantasy, weirdness and creepy madness. It's a good time for a story told by a 51-year-old math teacher and family man living in Massachusetts.













Spotlight

Celebrating National Native American Heritage Month

While thoughts are upon us for our holiday season, let's pause to reflect on National Native American Heritage Month. During November, the Helen E. Ellis Case welcomes an exhibit presented by Brianna McAvoy and Denise Micale. Pieces are shared from their collections of works by Native American tribes. Vintage and newer items by these Native artists, including pottery, basketry, a kachina-doll carving, and silver, turquoise and stone jewelry with their origin noted are displayed.

By the 16th century, Massachusetts was home to approximately 100,000 Native Americans. Berkshire County was home to the Mahican tribe represented by the sub-

tribe of the Stockbridge. The southern part of Worcester County was home to the Nipmuc tribe. The Pennacook tribe, sometimes called Merrimack and Pawtucket Indians, settled in northeastern Massachusetts. Living on Cape Cod, the Nauset tribe was also known as the Cape Indians. And how about the Massachusetts tribe that lived between Brockton and Salem?



The Wampanoag tribe stretched from eastern Rhode Island along the southeastern coast of Massachusetts, including Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket. Settlements were numerous in Westport. Some Native Americans were likely landowners, with men working as farmers, laborers, and mariners in Westport and the New Bedford area. The Westport Historical Society shares a wealth of information on its website. Visit https://wpthistory.org/ and search for Native Americans under BLOG.
