Your Library Connections

This issue, I'm going to let you in on one of the deepest, darkest secrets of Librarianship. It's not that we Librarians dabble in the arcane arts, although I did have a friend who worked at a library that had books bound in human skin. It's not that we memorize the entire contents of the Encyclopedia Britannica backwards. It's not that I actually carry the Lord of the Rings around with me at all times.....actually that is true, I do, but that's not a secret, I consider it a point of pride.

No, the real secret is that the time-old phrase "You Can't Judge a Book by Its Cover" is an utter lie. You can indeed judge a book by its cover, but what the cover tells you can be one of four things. If a book doesn't

have a good cover, it means that the publisher either doesn't think that the book will be able to make enough money to afford a good cover, or that the book



is so popular it doesn't need a cover to attract your attention.....and dollars. On the other hand, if a book does indeed have a good cover, then it means that either it's such a great book that the publisher knows it's worth the money to spend on an artist or illustrator to make a really attractive cover since the book will assuredly make that money back, or that it's such a mediocre book that only a good cover will get you to spend your money to buy it.

So there you have it. You can, in fact, judge a book by its cover, or at least you can narrow it down to one of four options. Regardless, you still can't tell which of the four it is without reading it yourself, so it only stands to reason that if you have the opportunity you should save your money and check it out from the Westport Free Public Library instead!

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A Chat with Dan The Brick Man by Brianna McAvoy



Interview with LEGO Master Builder Dan Steininger How did you begin your LEGO career?

I had a friend who worked at LEGO, in Enfield, Ct., who told me about a job. He said it was a very creative environment and filled with nutty people, and I would fit right in! I have always enjoyed doing art, but I never played with LEGOs as a child.

What do you hope kids will remember about your program?

First, that they had fun. Second, that they learned what it is like to be a Master Builder and feel that they have improved their building skills.

What skills do children learn from building LEGO models?

Small children sharpen motor skills and learn colors from LEGO Duplo. As they grow, they increase specialized awareness by attaching LEGO pieces to one another. They also learn structure and



form, basic art composition, counting, engineering, and teamwork on group builds. I am always amazed at the creativity when children "free build." I see the pride and sense of accomplishment they feel, when they finish a model.

What is the biggest LEGO build you have done?

The tallest was the "Statue of Liberty." The largest was The "City of Rio" which was my project, and it was for the 2016 Olympics. It took over one year. The components needed to be built in Denmark, England, Czech Republic and the USA, and then assembled in Rio de Janeiro. The actual city of Rio de Janeiro built a glass building to display the model that had nearly one million LEGO pieces and over 2,500 LEGO mini figures. I was thrilled to be invited to the opening ceremonies.

Funniest question you've been asked:

How much money do LEGO Master Builders earn? I tell them I can't say, but, I recently purchased a brand new Porsche... though I haven't put it together yet!

The Massachusetts Book Awards recognize significant works of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and children's/young adult literature published by current Commonwealth residents.



The Award winner in the Picture Book/Early Reader category is Wherever I Go (Atheneum Books for Young Readers/Simon & Schuster) by Mary Wagley Copp of Westport. This fictional story of a family in a refugee camp in Ethiopia captures the innocence and joy of childhood while portraying the courage, hardship and dreams of refugees everywhere.

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World of Books

Oh, What to Read Next!

Now that I am retired, I have started thinking about authors whose works I might focus on. While working, I generally read one or two chapters at night when nodding off. I always envied Library staff members who would continue reading a novel during break times, while I used those moments to ponder my growing list of emails. Happily, I now read much more than a few pages at a time, which has given me the freedom to explore the works of specific authors.

I chose to revisit Ann Patchett, who since publishing her first novel in 1992 has written seven more novels, four works of nonfiction, and two children's books. I first started reading Ann Patchett in 2012 with *State of Wonder* (a Minnesotan pharmaceutical researcher sets off into the Amazon jungle to find the remains of a colleague). I continued with *Bel Canto* (2001), which I grabbed from Michael's Book Store when leaving the Library one day. In it, terrorists take hostage a group of partygoers at the home of the vice president of a South American country.

Once retired, I decided to go back and read Patchett's first novel, *The Patron Saint of Liars*, a story about a woman who sought refuge in a home for unwed mothers in rural Kentucky in the 1960s (a bit slowgoing, but rewarding). I recently started *The Dutch House* (2019) on audiobook discs and have been finishing it via Hoopla (a free digital service with your library card). Set in Pennsylvania, a sister and brother try to cope with a dysfunctional family. Tom Hank's narration as the younger brother, Danny, brings the story full circle.

Patchett's latest collection, *These Precious Days: Essays*, was published in November 2021. I was lucky enough to have previously read three of her essays and am now hooked (Note: the essays are a great length for those who still nod off easily.)

I think my next focus might be on Louise Erdrich, who like Ann Patchett also owns an independent bookstore. Perhaps there is a theme here?

The box of cords and cables that don't belong to anything but I'm convinced will be useful someday.


Robin Winters:
