A Chat with Missy Perry by Denise Micale

How did you become a Nanoblock builder?

I had worked on some LEGO projects with my grandnephew and grandnieces but was not enamored with the process. When the pandemic began, I came across an easy LEGO set with an igloo and a castle online for my first solo build and then discovered Nanoblocks Sites to See during my



internet search. My first Nanoblocks build was Castle Neuschwanstein which is in Germany. I soon became an "armchair traveler" building the famous sites that I was unable to visit in real life at the time.

Aside from the size difference from LEGO blocks, how are the Nanoblocks unique?

Building the models reminds me of cross stitch work. There is a lot of counting to follow the templates and it requires close vision and focus to get it right, especially for the models with little color variation, like the Great Pyramid of Giza model. I also like that the models are inexpensive and take much less room to display, compared to LEGO.

You have over 70 models of Nanoblock, made in Japan, and Brixies, which are from Germany. Which one was the most challenging to build?

My Planet Earth model, which will be in the Library exhibit, was definitely the most difficult, because of the density, curvature and details involved.

Which age groups can build Nanoblocks or Brixies?

Most builds are intended for age 12 and over, but some can be built by ages 8+ with initial supervision/ assistance. Interestingly, the first Nanoblocks models were Pokemon characters.

Do you have any additional "armchair traveling" planned in the near future?

I actually plan on resting my eyes and playing more ukelele!



Spotlight

The Atwater-Donnelly Trio

I had the wonderful opportunity to visit with the husband-wife duo Elwood Donnelly and Aubrey Atwater, who will be performing at the Westport Library along with Cathy Clasper-Torch on Saturday, August 24th.

Aubrey's musical journey began with playing piano at age five and continued with acoustic guitar at age 15. While studying psychology at Brown University, she performed at campus coffeehouses and rallies.

A self-taught guitarist and harmonica player, Elwood has been performing music since age 15 when he joined a teen garage-band called The Lonely Things, whose first album was entitled "Our Generation."

In 1987 Aubrey and Elwood met at Stone Soup Coffee House in Providence where their lives as a duo took off. Married since 1989, these self-taught musicians, who play by ear, have researched and performed traditional folk music and dance in Appalachia, the Ozarks, New England, Ireland, England, and Prince Edward Island. Their instruments include the Appalachian mountain dulcimer, mandolin, old-time banjo, Irish tin whistle, bones, spoons, and limberjack, often with a beat derived from Aubrey's Appalachian clog dancing and French-Canadian footwork. Aubrey also shares stories and songs with patients during weekly visits to Hasbro Children's Hospital.

Aubrey and Elwood's 37 years together has resulted in a level of enjoyment, contentment, and comfort that is palpable. Because some of their admirers have followed them for years, audiences might consist of older folks; however, as I observed at their recent jam session, younger musicians and fans are also very much in the mix.

Since 2003, fiddler, cellist, and violinist (including the Chinese erhu) Cathy Clasper-Torch has joined Aubrey and Elwood, complementing their performances with heartfelt, spirited harmonies and improvisation. When not performing and recording with several area bands, Cathy teaches piano and violin.


