Your Library Connections

Juneteenth

Since 2020, June 19th is recognized in Massachusetts as Juneteenth Independence Day. We are asked by people what exactly this holiday commemorates, so let's look at the history behind Jubilee Day or Emancipation Day. The short version; Juneteenth commemorates the abolition of slavery in the United States.

But why that particular day? The path to ending slavery in the U.S. was a long and deadly one, with the Society of Friends taking an early role in the efforts to extend freedom to everyone living within America. When President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation went into effect on January 1st, 1863, it was a declaration of intent rather than an implemented act. The Proclamation applied only to areas of the U.S. that were in open rebellion because the Union obviously didn't control those areas. Only after the Union occupied a rebel area did people finally benefit from the Emancipation Proclamation and become free. The Confederates did not willingly share the news about freedom being declared for those suffering in bondage until they were compelled to do so.

Juneteenth commemorates the day Union soldiers finally arrived in Galveston, Texas on June 19th, 1865, and brought the news that slavery had been abolished. It is said that a day of thanksgiving and joy erupted amongst the now free people since that was the first that any had heard that freedom had been proclaimed. Some also use the day to commemorate the millions whose lives were taken from them by slavery and the horrors millions more suffered. By the end of 1865, when the 13th Amendment was ratified, slavery was abolished not only in the rebellious states, but throughout the entire country. In 1980, Texas recognized Juneteenth as a state holiday. Many other states joined it in the subsequent decades until Juneteenth became a federal holiday in 2021.

Tools of the Trade

You will be bringing a unique exhibit to the Library this May, Rich, occupying both the Helen Ellis case and the Manton Room. What will we be seeing?



My great uncle, Henry Osgood, (1874-1954), a bachelor

known as "Uncle Harry" to our family, owned a collection of woodworking tools in a beautiful toolbox, all meticulously cared for. I don't remember knowing him because I was so young when he passed, but I ended up with possession of the box and tools when my cousin sought a home for them. The wooden toolbox and the antique tools will be displayed in the case. Photographs of these items along with some other works will be exhibited in the Manton Room.

What drew you to your great uncle's tools as a theme for this exhibit?

It was obvious that my great uncle's tool collection meant a lot to him and it told me what kind of person he was and his place in our family. He even had his name stamped on the tools which indicated to me how much he valued them. The box and tools have a patina from use that add to their beauty in the way they were maintained over the years. I spent a lot of time with the box and tools before arranging and photographing them to tell their and Uncle Harry's story.

You are a lifelong educator, Rich. How did you become a professional photographer?

I bought my first camera when my granddaughter was born 18 years ago. Through the years, it has evolved into a passion of finding beautiful and interesting subjects to photograph and transform into art. These photographs of my great uncle's tools have always evoked interest and memories of the bygone tools that many viewers remember in their family home.

Spotlight

A Conversation with Robin Winters

Robin recently discovered the name of a Westport mariner who died in a horrific pirate attack in 1827. Oliver Potter was born here in Westport on October 12, 1802 and was the son of Edward and Betsey S. Potter.

In the spring of 1827, the 24-year-old Oliver left the port of Providence, R.I., aboard Brig *Crawford* on its third voyage to Mantazas, Cuba, to pick up rum, coffee, sugar and molasses for New York City. The *Crawford* had been built in the previous year in Troy (Fall River).

Jacque Alexander Tardy, a pirate by trade, was born in France in 1767. His family fled to Saint Domingue (Haiti) to escape the French Revolution. After stealing boats and captains' belongings up and down the east coast of the United States and serving time in various prisons, he sailed for Cuba where he enlisted the aid of three Spanish pirates. They boarded the *Crawford* with fake papers with a plan to capture her and sail to Africa or Europe instead of New York City. Impersonating a physician, which Tardy had done in the past, he attempted to poison the crew.

When the poison sickened but did not kill the crew, the pirates resorted to knives and swords. In the early morning of June 1, 1827, all crew members except for three individuals were killed in a bloody massacre, including Capt. Henry Brightman of Fall River. Oliver, having been severely stabbed in the abdomen, somehow climbed a mast and tried to escape. Having lost so much blood, he fell from the rigging into the ocean and was lost at sea.

First mate, Edmund Dobson from Somerset, MA., was spared by convincing Tardy that provisions were needed. So the *Crawford* headed for Fort Monroe near Norfolk, Virginia. Dobson escaped while the ship was at anchor. On reaching shore, he reported the massacre to officers at Fort Monroe, who took possession of the vessel. Tardy was discovered in the Captain's quarters where he had slit his own throat. The three other pirates were apprehended and were tried, found guilty and hung for piracy and murder.

For further reading about the trial of the three Spanish pirates, our History Room has a photocopy of the book about the *Crawford* which can be read in the Library.

This book is also available to read online. As well, UMASS Dartmouth has a copy of the book to read in their library.
