
Your Library Connections

Chat with Nancy Mullen, Library Aide by Carol Vidal

CV: Nancy, what roundabout route led you to working at the Westport Library?

NM: Well, I am originally from Arkansas and later moved to Brazil to work and live. While working there, I corresponded with a friend who just happened to live in Fall River thus, the connection to this area. When I moved to Fall River, I met my husband whose Mom was of the Westport Bordens. We've had a house in Westport for 18 years.

During the Covid years I was employed at a big box store that had rapidly diminishing personnel. I found my job duties increasing along with the stress so I began looking for new and different employment. When I saw the position at the Library on the Westport Town website the rest is history. I've been working here for two years now and love it.

CV: You have an interest in cookbooks so are you a good cook?

NM: I wouldn't call myself a great cook but I do like to entertain. I typically fix one of my "go to" recipes that I know people will like, such as my chicken and wild rice casserole. I've tried different recipes, too, because of peoples' various health and allergy requirements.

CV: Have you ever tried recipes from other countries?

NM: I've had foreign students and friends over and tried to cook foods they were familiar with to make them feel more at home. They've introduced me to some delicious dishes and they have also cooked along with me to teach me their countries' recipes.

CV: There are a multitude of recipes on the internet. Why do you recommend the Library's collection?

NM: The internet is fine for some recipes but there are drawbacks. Depending on your search words and your Googling, you may find that you are wasting time scrolling through countless recipes. It's easier looking through a physical cookbook, Also, you may be looking for gluten free, vegetarian, fat or salt free which complicates your search. The Library has over 600 cookbooks that can narrow your search for specific cookbooks and certain areas of the world. Looking through cookbooks could inspire you to try new recipes.




What's Happening in the Manton Room?

When it comes to cooking, let's say I'm not so hot. There are a handful of cooking concoctions where "I rock" and many others that have the consistency of a rock. Ironically, I entertain frequently. So I try new recipes and seek to improve.

Until I began working at the Library, it never crossed my mind it would have cookbooks available. Had I been missing out! Just at the Westport Library alone we have about 600 titles. The SAILS Library system has 68 oth-

er libraries, so you can imagine the banquet of cookbooks one can taste-test for free.

One of my single adult sons is trying new adventures in cooking—especially Indian curries and rich Italian pasta dishes. He's spent a decent amount of money on cookbooks in the last year. Sadly, he found only a few recipes he truly likes in each one. Save money.



We have a general category

of cookbooks for quick meals, cakes, and casseroles; baby food, barbeque and budget-friendly; also seafood, soups, and slow-cookers. There are special diet cookbooks like keto and cancer-wellness. We have famous chef cookbooks, for example, by Emeril Lagasse. We have ethnic cookbooks from Greek to Southern to Amish. There are learning-how-to-cook books (all ages...maybe I should check one out). There is also The Pleasures of Cooking for One.

Got Harry Potter fans in the family? We have a charming book on foods that looks like magical items in those movies. Or, why not grill up something from your favorite magazines, food shows or restaurants—like Legal Sea Foods. Do you enjoy really local? How about



The Handy House Cookbook, New England Clam Shack, or Wampanoag cooking?

Booksale End: Many Hands Make Swift Work
