No Library Stands Alone

Coming to the end of my first year as FOWL president, I am thrilled to report that the collaboration between FOWL and the Library continues to bear fruit. Working together, both parties contributed questions for the recent *Library Long-Range Planning Survey*.

The survey results thus helped to provide all Library supporters and staff with a roadmap for future investments and programming. Survey responses varied widely but many stated that the following factors are crucial to a vibrant library:

- A friendly and competent staff.
- Adequate funding from all available sources.
- Community involvement through volunteering and donations.
- Ongoing programming: topical lectures, author appearances, and concerts were of particular interest.

Personal survey comments included the following:

- "The Library was very important to me when my children were young and now that my husband and I are retired we love going to the Library . . ."
- "The Library is vital to our community . . . its services are outstanding and its staff knowledgeable."
- "I would like to see the Town spend more on funding the Library. We rely very heavily on FOWL, state funding, and donations."
- "It would be nice to see some newer non-fiction . . . specifically around hobbies and [craft] activities."
- "The Library smells like good books."

Signs of Progress

- FOWL's events continue to be free and available to all.
- Recent programs have elicited positive and constructive feedback.
- The rising number of FOWL bookplates is an indicator of the group's expanded book budget.
- New discount passes to the New England Aquarium and the Children's Museum of Greater Fall River.

Ancestry.com Library Edition

One of the most interesting research tools we have available at the Westport Free Public Library is our Ancestry.com Library Edition subscription. From any of the public computers available at the library, you can click on the Ancestry.com logo on the desktop and start digging into your family's own story. Of course, some of what you find might not be what you expected. When I dug down into my great-great grandfather's naturalization papers forswearing any and all further allegiance and fidelity to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, I stumbled upon two new facts.

First, my namesake declared that he first came to the US in 1877, which was a full six years before we thought he first arrived on these shores. At the time, he would've only been about fourteen years old and came alone. Secondly, we had the wrong birth-place for him. Everyone in the family said he was born in the town of Blackburn in Lancashire. Again though, his papers state he was actually born in Barnsley, South Yorkshire! One little piece of paper had enough information in it to change my family's allegiance in the War of the Roses!

But the best thing I have found yet, the little thing that matters the most to me, wasn't the date we arrived in Boston. It wasn't proving we did have those Mayflower roots everybody said we did (But not from the passenger we thought). No, my favorite thing was finding a copy of New Bedford High's yearbook from 1945 that actually had an inscription my grandfather left for the book's owner. His handwriting was still the same back then as it was on my old birthday cards. It was like getting this new little piece of him to remember and share with the rest of my family.

It can be a little intimidating trying to use the computer at first; it does have a lot of different bells and whistles, but the staff is always here to help you. I found some really neat stuff in a couple of hours. I hope all of you will too.

Chat with Jill Buffington by Linda Harrop

Meet Jill E. Buffington, creator of Jubi Books, a local resident and personal development consultant. She is the author and illustrator of these delightful stories. She shares her home with pup, Dreyfus and three kitties, Shamu, Hefner and Gideon. She noted that decades ago she had an idea about writing a fun-loving story that children could relate too. After 2-1/2 years of



work, the Jubi books have recently become a reality.

What or who is Jubi?

Jubi! That's short for Jubilee, the fun-loving and furry character in a 4-book inspirational series for children focusing on positive social and emotional learning by encouraging children to be creative, trust their intuition, choose happiness, and pursue their dreams. Using bright colors and whimsical themes, Jubi was created so children can join in with his spirited, child-like wonder while reading the series.

How did you begin creating your illustrations and books?

My artistic work includes a combination of residential and commercial paintings, sculptures, book illustrations and jewelry. My grandmother, Janice Buffington, a professional artist, was my mentor who instilled a strong artistic foundation, as well as many of the creative inspirations I use today. I also have illustrated books for others.

What do you see in the future for your books?

Recently, a private donor purchased 1000 of my books to be put into backpacks for disadvantaged children through the Hands on Hartford (Connecticut) organization. To promote my books, I do readings at malls, fairs, libraries and even on a coastal cruise. My vision is to see Jubi as a television show and a Hasbro product.



Miss Ellis' fondest wish was to leave her beloved home to the community. The proceeds were used to establish the Helen E. Ellis Charitable Trust.

A FOWL by Any Other Name

Some years ago, good friend Kate and at that time, a Westport resident, approached me in the Library parking lot. After the usual hellos, she grinned. And then a warm chuckle, almost a gurgle.

"I've got the perfect organization for you to join. It's called fowl." Another chuckle.

"Now Kate, just because I have 27 hens and a rooster in the barn —" $\,$

"Well, there is that, of course. But the name's in caps: FOWL for Friends Of Westport Library."

"Better that than Friends Of Upton Library."

"You would think of that. No, listen-"

I did and became a member, and thereby hangs not a tale, but an explanation of FOWL's importance to Westporters.

The Westport Free Public Library is of course "free" in the open-to-everybody sense. But certainly not in the financial sense. Of course, the Town has the Library in its budget, but that source of funds is constrained by the number of other no less vital demands on it. The Library budget cannot always pay for the necessary educational materials to meet the minimum requirements to maintain certification by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

That certification is crucial to the Westport Library—and thus the town. Lower case T. Meaning you and me.

So, the *Friends* (a more formal appellation than *Fowlers*) create activities that add significantly to the Library budget: the Summer Paperback (think beach books) Sale, later the Annual Book Sale, and membership in FOWL itself. Friends tot up all the collected Lees receipts. And provide Westporters (and others) with other mind-widening benefits for example—The World of Beatrix Potter for adults, Candida Rose Cape Verde music for adults, Toe Jam Puppet Band for kids, and activities (museum passes, computer access, WiFi access, and more). And there's even Michael's Book Store.

Whew—the above accomplished by FOWL; no little chicken, this organization.

Plan to spend about 2 hours to visit the touch tank, the adorable African penguins, the 4story 40-foot wide 200,000gallon Giant Ocean Tank



designed to replicate a Caribbean reef and much more. There are feedings five times a day that last an hour and takes divers 24 feet into the tank. For additional charges, there is an IMAX theater and even whale watches.

The quietest times to visit are weekdays first thing in the morning. The Aquarium is open 9-6 daily. You can learn more at www.neaq.org. Thanks to all our FOWL members for helping us all have fun and save that hardearned money.
